

Safety tips for the yoga class: A yoga mat is recommended but not necessary. Exercise on non-slippery surface. Use towel, and/or chair



ANTH 454/455: UIUC Island and Coastal Archaeology Summer Field School
June 16 - July 26, 2021




This course is a hands-on learning experience in archaeology. The class introduces archaeological field techniques and outlines a critical understanding of the methods and approaches by which archaeology and heritage are interpreted. Through exercises and participation in an archaeological research project, students will be introduced to the methods of archaeology, including excavation, data and materials recovery, recording, and processing.

Students will be encouraged to critically examine how archaeological knowledge is constructed and expressed. Because the class is held in a remote location, students are also required to learn to live and work together as a group while they contribute to the success of a long-term archaeological research project.

Location: Sapelo Island, Georgia


- Survey and excavate one of the largest and longest occupied sites on the Georgia Coast
- Investigate how the political collapse and abandonment of a thriving region affected Native Americans living on the Georgia Coast during the 14th century

PATRICIA O'BRIEN AWARD IN ANTHROPOLOGY

The Patricia O'Brien Award will be presented this spring to the student who submits a superior undergraduate anthropology paper. Any undergraduate anthropology major or minor may enter. The award this year includes a prize of \$500 to the winner.

The papers will be judged on the basis of excellence as demonstrated by problem focus, development of ideas, literature covered, writing style, originality, and contribution to the field. Papers will be judged by the department's Awards Committee consisting of faculty members from all of the field's subdisciplines. At the committee's discretion, an outside reviewer may be asked to assist in the evaluation of a particular entry.

Papers must be submitted no later than 3:00pm Monday, March 22, 2021. Papers must be submitted electronically to Karla Harmon at kharmon@illinois.edu. The papers must be double typed, and the format should be as appropriate for professional journals such as American Anthropologist, American Antiquity, or American Journal of Physical Anthropology. The paper must be anthropological in subject matter and approach. Senior honor theses, course research papers, fieldwork analyses, and independent projects are all acceptable entries. The paper must have been written or substantially developed while the student has been at the University of Illinois not to exceed 35 pages.

The O'Brien Award Committee will announce the winner via email, which would have normally been presented at the Department Awards Banquet, but has been cancelled for this spring. The department will display the winner's name on the Patricia O'Brien Award plaque in Room 110 Davenport Hall. The recipient will also receive a formal letter of acknowledgment from the head of the Department.

Eligibility: Any student with freshman standing at UIUC for the 2020-2021 school year



OUT OF ISOLATION SERIES: "INFECTIOUS DETENTION: MIGRANTS, COVID-19, AND THE RACIAL POLITICS OF HEALTH"

This talk focuses on detention care and its deadly consequences in the United States. Between October 2003 and November 2020, there were at least 216 deaths in Immigration and Customs Enforcement custody, many the result of grossly inadequate medical practices. Focusing on deaths from COVID-19, this talk argues that, rather than being beneficiaries of care, noncitizens in detention are routinely victims of uncared-of a dearth or absence of both affective (concern about) and practical (providing for) care. The consequence of this uncared-of is that migrant lives are imperiled to the point of death.

BIOARCHAEOLOGY IN CROATIA 2021

Bioarchaeology in Croatia I: This program will focus on the study of the human skeleton and the cultural contexts from which they come. They will focus on osteology, learning the names of all the bones of the body as well as the features of the body. Additionally, they will focus on the cultural construction of the body through artificial modification, traumatic lesions, and paleopathology. Modern techniques such as isotopic and DNA analysis will be discussed and a special imaging workshop will be conducted at the University Hospital where they will get first-hand exposure to imaging such as X-ray and CT. All of this will take place while living in the beautiful city of Zagreb, just a half block from the main square with weekends exploring Neanderthal sites and experiencing the vibrant city of Zagreb. Bioarchaeology in Croatia II: This program provides four weeks of excavation experience within the site of Durdevac-Sosice, a medieval church and cemetery. Burial excavation will be conducted under the supervision of the program supervisor and Croatian site supervisor. Students will work with Croatian archaeologists to learn proper excavation methodology and technique. They will excavate, map and pull burials for laboratory analysis. Students also will work with Croatian archaeologists in aspects of computer aided mapping and photogrammetry.
